

U.S. Senator's Report

Washington, DC

Dear Friends,

On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6th Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the *American Rescue Plan*, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the *American Rescue Plan* is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the *American Rescue Plan*, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband – because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21st century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in the *American Rescue Plan*, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've accomplished this year – but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

U.S. Senator's Report

Washington, DC

Dear Friends:

I am deeply honored to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of the areas I have been working on over the past year.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose enormous challenges for our state and our country. When the pandemic began, I coauthored the Paycheck Protection Program that helped small businesses remain afloat and keep their employees paid. In Maine, our small businesses received more than 47,000 forgivable loans totaling \$3.2 billion. I also led efforts to provide relief for loggers, lobstermen, and bus companies.

In addition, I helped secure \$700 million to assist Maine's overwhelmed hospitals and nursing homes, and a new law I led prevented Medicare payment cuts to help further ease the financial strain on our hospitals. I also urged the CDC to update its recommendations so that our students and teachers could safely return to their classrooms, and I pressed the Administration to end the closure of the U.S.-Canada border.

While addressing the pandemic has been a major focus, I've also worked hard to ensure Maine's other needs are met. A group of 10 Senators, of which I was a part, negotiated the landmark bipartisan infrastructure bill that was signed into law in November. I co-authored the section of the bill that will provide Maine with as much as \$300 million to expand high-speed internet in rural and underserved areas.

Soaring inflation is another crisis, particularly when it comes to the cost of heating oil. I have strongly supported federal programs that help Maine families stay warm. In November, Maine was awarded \$35 million to help low-income Mainers pay their energy bills. And the bipartisan infrastructure bill included \$3.5 billion to help families make energy efficiency improvements that would permanently lower their heating costs.

As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I have supported investments in Maine's communities. This year's funding bills include \$265 million I championed for 106 projects across Maine. These projects would help create jobs, improve workforce training, address the opioid crisis, and increase access to childcare and health care services. In addition, I worked to reverse proposed cuts to our Navy in order to help protect America and keep the skilled workers at Bath Iron Works on the job. The bills also

include \$475 million for the construction of a new dry dock at Maine's Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that will allow the Navy to continue to carry out its submarine missions. I will keep working to get these important bills enacted.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,000th consecutive vote, becoming the only Senator in history to do so without ever having missed a roll call vote. The Lugar Center at Georgetown University once again ranked me as the most bipartisan Senator for the eighth year in a row.

In the New Year, I will keep working to solve problems and make life better for the people of Maine and America. May 2022 be a happy, healthy, and successful one for you, your family, and our state.

U.S. Congress

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well. It is an honor to represent you and your family during these challenging times, and I am thankful for the opportunity to update you on my work in Washington and Maine.

The COVID-19 pandemic continues to cause challenges for people in Maine and across the country. Please know that the health and safety of you and your loved ones, as well as the economic recovery of our communities, remains the driving force behind legislation I have pushed for in Congress.

In early 2021, Congress passed the American Rescue Plan, historic legislation that makes investments to crush the virus, create millions of jobs, provide direct relief to working families, and help schools remain safely open. Not only did this legislation give 90 percent of American households a stimulus check, but it also helped local and state governments better respond to the pandemic, put food on families' tables, got more vaccine shots into arms, cut child poverty in half through the expanded Child Tax Credit, and so much more. The American Rescue Plan is one of the most important pieces of legislation Congress will ever pass, and I'm so proud to have supported it from the beginning. Our economic recovery from the pandemic will be accelerated even more thanks to the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, which Congress passed in November. This legislation marks the most expansive infrastructure investment since the construction of the interstate highway system. From funding to repair our aging roads, bridges, and ports to high-speed broadband expansion and legacy pollution clean-up, this law is a once-in-a-generation investment in our future.

In addition to working on COVID-19 relief legislation, my Congressional colleagues and I are also collaborating on legislation that addresses the climate crisis, supports voting rights, and—through my role on the House Appropriations Committee—supports programs important to Maine.

After seven years on the House Appropriations Committee, I took the gavel and lead the subcommittee that oversees discretionary spending for the Department of the Interior, the Environmental Protection Agency, US Forest Service, and several agencies related to the arts and humanities. In my new role as Chair, I have fought to secure significant funding for Maine's tribes, environmental preservation programs, our cultural economy, and our forests.

I will keep pushing legislation to support America's long-term care needs, lower prescription drug costs, expand Medicare benefits, cut taxes for working people, make our workforce competitive with the world, and fight climate change.

So, as we reflect on 2021, let us welcome 2022 with a renewed sense of optimism. There is a lot to fight for, and I assure you I will continue to fight for Maine in Congress. I want you to know that my staff and I are doing all we can to support Mainers through this public health crisis and all the challenges that come with it. State Senator's Report

Dear Neighbors in Jefferson,

Thank you for the opportunity to represent you in the Maine Senate; I am truly humbled that you chose me to be your voice in Augusta during this unprecedented time.

In our first session, the Legislature focused on laws that would make a real difference in the lives of all Maine people. We passed laws to help improve access to affordable, high-quality medical care and lifesaving medications like insulin. We invested in senior living and nursing facilities and in our direct care workers, who have been so vital during the pandemic. We passed a two-year bipartisan budget that, for the first time, meets the state's obligation to fund 55% of K-12 public education. We also restored municipal revenue sharing and increased property tax relief programs, all of which will help reduce property taxes for Maine people.

In the Legislature, I have been appointed to serve on the Marine Resources Committee and the Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry Committee. These committees are responsible for overseeing matters that directly impact our communities and heritage industries, like farming and fishing. We know that the coming years will present these industries with real challenges if we do not prepare, and the survival of these industries is essential. Protecting our environment and natural resources is a priority for me because of the impacts it has on our health, our culture and our economy.

On January 5, 2022, the Legislature began the second regular session, which is scheduled to continue until mid-April. Our committee work will be conducted remotely for the time being, but we will be meeting in person at the State House to vote on legislation. Every committee meeting is streamed live and archived at www.legislature.maine.gov, and you can also testify during public hearings from the comfort of your own home. The State House is open to visitors, and I encourage you to visit any time.

I know many in our community are still struggling, and I want to remind you that I'm here as a resource for you and your family. State Representative's Report

Dear Friends & Neighbors:

As preparations begin to welcome the New Year, I want to take this opportunity to once again thank the good people of District 88 for allowing me the opportunity to serve them at the State House. Challenges caused by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic still make daily headlines, while policy makers at all levels of government work to restore some sense of normalcy by exploring available options to preserve constituents' overall wellbeing. Maine's economy appears to be weathering these unprecedented times, as State revenue forecasters project Maine will collect \$822 million more than initially expected during the current two-year budget cycle ending in mid-2023 - an increase of nearly 10 percent.

The Second Regular Session of the 130th Maine Legislature is set to begin January 5, 2022, and statutory adjournment is set for April 20, 2022. Legislators will attempt to finalize the various bills carried over from the First Regular Session, at the same time as taking into consideration new legislation deemed to be emergency in nature, dealing with budgetary matters, proposals from the Governor, initiatives submitted pursuant to statute, legislation submitted pursuant to authorized studies, and legislation submitted by direct initiative petition of the electors. Much of this business will likely once again be conducted virtually, so I would encourage you to monitor the Legislature's Web site if you have an interest in following proceedings.

Other means to stay up to date on the latest State Government news is by providing me with your email address so that it can be added to my regular e-newsletter distribution list, as well as signing up to receive notifications via Maine.gov at https://www.maine.gov/portal/subscriptions/email.html. Maine.gov offers a convenient way to sign up for free email and SMS text notifications It also allows you to sign up for email and wireless updates about topics relevant to your interests.

Again, thank you for the privilege of being your voice at the capitol. It is a responsibility I am honored to have and do not take lightly.

Jefferson Public Library

There were no events during the year due to pandemic protocols. However, the Jefferson Girl Scouts began meeting in the library again, and now meet every other week. In May, Mrs. Andrea Greenlaw and her daughter Shayla started up a Chess Club for JVS students and they meet every Tuesday. At the end of the year, in November, an Adult Reading Group began and they will be gathering every other Thursday, opposite the Girl Scouts.

During 2021, we served 1,049 people and circulated 1,169 books and we gained 16 new patrons. We were not able to order from the Maine State Library Outreach Services as that Library has been moving this year. We rented 73 books from the McNaughton Book Rental Service. They consist of the current best sellers, popular authors, classic books, Maine books, books by Maine authors, fiction and non-fiction books, large print books. We have on hand audio books, a limited supply of DVDs, a TELESCOPE, and a MICROSCOPE available for you to borrow.

We held our yearly Children's Summer Reading Program as usual. For each book a child reads they get a ticket, the tickets are pooled together and once a week a name is drawn and that child receives a \$5 gift certificate to the Jefferson Scoop. At the end of the summer we have an extra drawing for \$10 and \$15 gift certificates to the Maine Coast Bookshop in Damariscotta. We had 28 children participating this past summer and they read a total of 413 books!!

The Public Library is FREE! Please stop by and check us out.

Special thanks to all who use the Public Library, to those who donate resources and funds. Many thanks to our library board members who continue to support us.

The Jefferson Public Library is in the Jefferson Village School Library. We are open from 4 - 7 PM on Tuesdays & Thursdays during the school year. We are closed when the school is closed. (Channel 8 has winter storm closings for the Library also). In the summer, we are also open on Wed. 4 - 7 PM. Our monthly board meetings are on the 2nd TUESDAY in the Public Library at 5 PM. 2021 Fire Chief's Report

"Professionally Served by Volunteers since 1941"

While it is never a "good" thing when we have to respond to an emergency, we are proud to be able to help our community when they need us most. Want to learn more about us or how to become a volunteer member? Visit our Facebook page or stop by the fire station any Thursday evening.

Now in our 81st year of service, your friends and neighbors who are the volunteer firefighters, Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) and Emergency Medical First Responders (EMRs) of Jefferson Fire and Rescue responded to 351 incidents in 2021. The calls for assistance included 7 structure fires, 30 motor vehicle accidents, 5 chimney fires, 2 vehicle fires, and 207 medical calls in Jefferson. We responded to provide mutual aid to neighboring communities 54 times.

Fire Calls

Fortunately there were no major fire incidents in Jefferson in 2021. In several of the fires, early detection by building occupants and their proper response were important factors in minimizing fire damage. These response factors include:

- Early fire detection due to properly operating smoke detectors. Please remember to test your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors and replace batteries as needed.
- Have an escape plan and practice fire drills. In the event of a fire, get everyone out as quickly as possible. Close doors and windows to prevent fire spread. Call 9-1-1 when it is safe to do so.

We did see a significant increase in the number of brush and woods fires this year due to the drought conditions. Please remember that burning permits are required for open burning. Due to the coronavirus restrictions, burn permits are no longer issued in person. To address this change, Jefferson residents can now access free online burn permits at wardensreport.com. Please remember that burning permits are only available after 5 PM on weekdays. Burn permits are also available free online from WardensReport. com.

Emergency Medical Service

Jefferson Fire & Rescue continues to provide First Responder service for medical emergencies in our community. Our Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) and First Responders (EMRs) are skilled professionals who respond to victims of illness or injury. Jefferson Fire & Rescue is not a licensed transporting service and therefore a transporting ambulance is dispatched at the same time the call is received.

The coronavirus has had a significant impact on our EMS responders. Maine EMS has developed many new response protocols, training requirements and personal protective equipment (PPE) regulations to ensure the safety of our first responders and the public we serve. Several local residents made and donated face masks to help protect our folks. Thank you! We also applied for and were awarded a \$1,200 Federal Fire Act Grant that allowed us to purchase the additional PPE needed to protect our first responders at no cost to Jefferson taxpayers.

Many times the Basic Life Support service provided by our volunteer EMTs and EMRs is all that is necessary and patients are not transported to the hospital. However some patients do require the Advanced Life Support provided by Waldoboro EMS or Central Lincoln County Ambulance. Unfortunately, the Jefferson community is not immune to the drug abuse crisis. Several times this past year Jefferson First Responders arrived at medical calls to find the patients not breathing and with no pulse. Thanks to the quick response of our First Responders, the patients were given Narcan to reverse an opioid overdose and the patients were revived.

Waldoboro EMS continues to provide transport ambulance service to the northern half of Jefferson. Central Lincoln County Ambulance provides this service in the southern sections of Jefferson. Both of these services deserve our financial support.

Membership and Training

Jefferson Fire & Rescue currently has 28 active members consisting of 19 firefighters, 6 firefighter/EMTs, 1 firefighter/EMR, and 2 EMTs. We are the only truly volunteer fire department in Lincoln County. Our members do not receive any salary, stipend or other remuneration for responding to alarms. Many other departments pay their members on an hourly basis significantly increasing their annual budget. We welcome anyone interested in volunteering as a firefighter, emergency medical responder, or both to please contact one of our members or stop by the fire station any Thursday evening.

Firefighter training drills continue to be held on the second and fourth Thursday of each month, with EMS training conducted on the first Thursday of each month. Jefferson volunteer firefighters and EMTs dedicated more than 2,500 hours of their time attending numerous training classes and drills throughout 2021. In addition to training on fire suppression tactics such as water supply, hose line operations, ladder operations and similar topics, our members received training on how to properly respond to a wide variety of incidents including structure fires, vehicle fires, chimney fires, and hazardous materials incidents.

Fire Apparatus & Equipment

Jefferson Fire & Rescue continues to operate two fire stations. The main station houses two Pumper Trucks, a Squad Truck which carries our vehicle extrication and rescue equipment, a Tank Truck that carries 3500 gallons of water, a Forestry Truck, a Rescue Boat, and our First Responder EMS vehicle. The South Jefferson station houses one Pumper Truck.

Engine 2, the 1989 Pumper Truck that was located in the South Jefferson station had to be removed from service due to a serious corrosion issue. Since none of our other trucks would fit in the South Jefferson station, the members donated their time to "bump out" the rear wall of the building so Engine 1 could be relocated to South Jefferson.

Thanks to the support of our community, the Select Board approved a contract with the Sutphen Corporation of Dublin, Ohio for a new Pumper Truck to replace two older trucks. The new Pumper Truck should arrive later this year.

Improved ISO Rating May Your Lower Insurance Premiums

If you own a home or business in Jefferson, please remember to review your insurance policy when it is renewed. After several years of hard work involving meeting stringent training requirements, updating firefighting equipment, certifying water sources and testing all of our fire hose and pumps, Jefferson Fire & Rescue was notified in that we have improved our Insurance Service Office, Inc. (ISO) rating to a Class 5 Hauled Water Classification.

ISO is a leading source of information about risk for the property and casualty insurance industry. ISO is used by insurance companies in most states to evaluate fire departments for the purpose of establishing insurance premiums in the local areas. ISO evaluates various factors impacting response to fires in a community to establish a grading called a Public Protection Classification (PPC).

A rating of PPC Class 1 is the best a fire department can receive. Of the 478 Fire Departments in Maine rated by ISO, there is only one that has a Class 1 rating. A rating of PPC Class 10 is the worst rating. There are 161 Fire Departments in Maine rated as PPC Class 1 through 5, with the vast majority of these communities having a municipal water supply and fire hydrant system, an important factor in the ISO rating system. Most rural communities like Jefferson (no municipal water system) have a PPC Class rating of 8 – 10. The Insurance Service Office (ISO) Public Protection Classification for any property within 5 miles of one of our two fire stations (or our mutual aid Fire Departments) has been assigned a PPC Class 5.

Fire Service Explorers Post No. 343

The Jefferson Fire & Rescue Explorers Post No. 343 was established five years ago. Fire and Emergency Service Career Exploring is open to young men and women ages 14 and are not yet 21 years old (and who have completed the 8th grade) with an interest in learning more about careers in the field of Fire and Emergency Services.

Fire and Emergency Services Exploring is a hands-on program that exposes participants to many career experiences, leadership opportunities, and community service activities. The primary goals of the program are to help young adults choose a career path within fire and emergency services and to challenge them to become responsible citizens of their community and country.

There are presently 2 members of the Post. The Jefferson Fire & Rescue Explorers Post 343 attend fire and EMS training sessions on Thursday evenings. The Explorers selected the Post Number 343 in honor of the 343 firefighters who died responding to the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. If you or anyone you know are interested in Fire Service Exploring, you are encouraged to join us at our meetings!

Help Us Help You

Many of you live in homes that are located on private roads or long driveways. The use of large reflective address signs can help us quickly locate your home. Jefferson Fire & Rescue can provide these signs for you at a nominal fee. Additional information on these signs and order forms are available at the Town Office. If your home or camp is located on a private road or a long driveway please remember that ambulances and fire trucks are larger than cars. It is important to properly maintain your driveway or private road. Keep them clear of overgrown bushes, low hanging tree branches and other obstacles that may delay our response to your emergency.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Office

As I begin my 20th year as your Sheriff, I look back at 2021 as a year of planning and I look forward to 2022 as a year of action.

During the past year, my team and I began closely tracking our crime and crash locations with an emphasis on enhancing our patrols in the areas reporting high totals in both. Based on a national model for data driven policing we plan, in early 2022, to focus some of our patrols in three areas of the County, identified by our data. Our goal is to use the data to enhance the location and time of day of some of our patrol activity. Our hope is to see a reduction in both crash and crime as a result.

Additionally in 2021 we began a more formal process to track our use of force reports. This data for 2021 will be available for viewing on our website (www.lincolnso.me) in January of 2022 with plans to update the data each quarter in 2022. The decision to share this information is based solely on our goal to improve communication and transparency. It is simply a window into what we do and how often we do it with regard to the use of physical force. Take a look, you may find it interesting and certainly if you have any questions or concerns, let me know.

We also put in place the building blocks for a citizen's advisory committee (CAC) last year. As it develops, the group will provide me community perspective and opinion on a wide range of issues including policy review. The CAC will be diverse in every way and serve a vital role during our plan to be one of the first Sheriff's Offices in the State of Maine to receive accreditation thru the Maine Law Enforcement Accreditation Program sponsored by the Maine Chiefs of Police Association. The accreditation process is underway, with a goal of reaching accreditation in early 2023.

Many law enforcement agencies both locally and nationally have struggled to fill their vacancies and we too have struggled. I am happy to report I have hired five new deputy sheriffs since late 2021. These new deputies are diverse in many ways including the first full-time female Patrol Deputy in over 10 years. We do still have some openings, three in fact as of the date of this letter. If you know someone who is looking for a unique opportunity to serve our community, please have them reach out to me or any of my staff.

Jefferson Scholarship Committee

Jefferson Scholarship Endowment Fund

The Jefferson Scholarship Endowment Fund was established June 1981 at a special town meeting through the efforts of the first committee, Calvin Clark, Melvin Geisler and Andrew Williamson.

At the same time, the Jefferson Woman's Club declared this to be their current Community Improvement Project and the fund began to grow thanks to contributions from local organizations and individuals. As a result, in 1987 the first two awards of \$100 each were presented to deserving high school graduates from the Town of Jefferson.

At the March 1989 Town Meeting, the voters approved the expenditure of \$1,000 every year to the Jefferson Scholarship Endowment Fund.

Ada Packard and Joan Levesque Merit Achievement Awards

The Jefferson Woman's Club was very active in the community for 50 years. Every year the Club awarded two \$100 Merit Achievement awards to graduating seniors from Jefferson. Two Jefferson residents and members of the Woman's Club were honored by naming the awards after them.

When the Woman's Club disbanded, they presented the town with their existing funds to be used for these awards.

Ada Packard was a teacher in the Jefferson Village school and in retirement, volunteered in the classroom several days a week for many years.

Joan Levesque was an active community leader, and served on the School Board and many other committees of the Town.

For both these ladies, education was the key to success and they worked hard and long to provide the best education possible for Jefferson residents.

At present, the interest on the principal is low, so the amount available to award from both these funds in 2021 was \$1,000. However, in 2020 the town approved the expenditure of \$3,000 annually for scholarships, to be awarded in its entirety, not just from the interest earned, so the committee was able to give more money to students.

In 2021, the recipient was Isabela Libby The Committee wishes her and all graduating seniors success in their endeavors.

Jefferson K-12 Education Report

Craig Jurgensen, Superintendent of Schools, AOS 93

The Central Lincoln County School System – aka "AOS 93" – serves seven towns: Bremen, Bristol, Damariscotta, Jefferson, Newcastle, Nobleboro, and South Bristol. There are five schools: Bristol Consolidated, Jefferson Village, Nobleboro Central, South Bristol and Great Salt Bay (serving Bremen, Damariscotta and Newcastle) with over 800 students attending PreK to eighth grade. CLCSS does not operate a high school, each AOS 93 town pays tuition to a local public or private high school. In 2021 there were 527 students attending area public high schools or private academies. There are nine school boards with one for each of the seven communities, one for GSB and an AOS 93 board. It is a complicated school system but one in which strong community support, parent involvement, and a highly skilled and committed staff is focused and actively engaged in providing rich and robust learning opportunities for all students.

2021 was a year of challenge and change in AOS 93 schools.

The primary challenge was, of course, the impact of the pandemic on students, staff, and families. During the spring we continued our emphasis on keeping students healthy and, to the extent possible, learning in their classrooms and interacting with their friends and teachers. Although a distance learning option was available for families to choose, we emphasized and focused on our in-person instruction knowing how important the contact and interaction was for learning, as well as for emotional development and wellbeing. We worked diligently to approach school as "business as usual" even as we followed the mandates, recommendations, and guidelines that directed our prevention and mitigation strategies.

With the start of the 2021-22 school year in September, we returned with renewed optimism, an emphasis on maximizing our in-person instruction, and revised recommendations for our standard operating procedures. School planning teams and school boards diligently and conscientiously reviewed and laid out the best plans possible for each school's opening plans based on the few remaining mandates and many recommendations focused on developing and implementing an effective response to the prevention and mitigation strategies needed to support student and staff health and contain and limit spread of the virus in our schools. Although each of our schools found it necessary for short periods of time to move to a remote instructional model either as an entire school or for particular classrooms, our emphasis

and goals were to continue to support student learning in the classroom. All of us worked together, thoughtfully collaborating to problem solve and respond to each new and unique situation. Communication and collaboration were the keys to keeping schools open with teachers and students engaged in teaching and learning. As we approached the end of 2020, schools increased their use of onsite COVID testing and offered vaccination clinics with help from Lincoln Health to deploy new tools to respond to the pandemic.

Without question, the challenges of 2021 brought many operational changes to AOS 93. Other changes were evident too. At South Bristol School, Scott White, after 13 years as the school principal, moved to Union Elementary School. In his place, Charles (Chuck Hamm), having worked in Belfast and Islesboro, was hired as the SBS principal. Jason Adickes transitioned from a long and successful tenure at GSB to assume the school leadership position of principal at Jefferson Village School. Returning to AOS 93, Ira Michaud, after four years as the principal at Edgecomb Eddy School in AOS 98, was hired to lead Nobleboro Central School. These new principals along with Jennifer Ribeiro at Bristol Consolidated School and Kim Schaff and Assistant Principal Kami Peaslee at Great Salt Bay Community School, Assistant Superintendent of Schools Lysnsey Johnston, Director of Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment, Ann Hassett, and Director of Special Services, Kelly Stokes, CLCSS has the strongest and most dedicated professional administrative leadership team I have had the privilege to work with as a public-school administrator.

Other changes included the hiring of many new staff in different roles in each school. An upgrade and refinement of a new AOS 93 website was launched in November. At the December AOS 93 board meeting, a revised Interlocal Agreement was unanimously approved. The new agreement updates the original 2008 agreement that brought the seven towns together to form CLSCSS. While some operational changes were included, the majority of the updates resulted in a more concise and clearer document. Both the 2008 original and the 2021 revision are available on the AOS 93 website. School board meetings that moved from the traditional well-established face to face format to fully remote Zoom meetings in 2020 returned to in-person meetings with a remote option in September 2021. This change, coupled with an asynchronous YouTube viewing option, broadened community access and participation in the monthly school board meetings. Enhanced remote instruction capabilities and the refined online tools available to teachers accessed due to the pandemic provided with us with remote instructional options to use as an alternative to full closures due to weather related events. Receiving substantial federal funds through ESSR and CARES supported significant upgrades to school ventilation, facilities improvements to enable

social distancing requirements, and staffing increases that provided smaller student-staff ratios, increased attention to cleaning protocols, and significant improvements to educational technologies.

Since March 2020 our primary instructional focus in AOS 93 has been supporting students, families, and educators through pandemic learning, and at the same time we have continued to make progress in other areas of curriculum, instruction, and assessment. This work has included ensuring instructional continuity during periods of school closing and disrupted learning, providing an alternative for students who were unable to attend school when we reopened in September 2020, supporting continued staff learning with an initial day of training for new employees and both remote and in-person professional development focused on best instructional practices and the physical and emotional safety of all of our students. In July and August 2021, we partnered with Central Lincoln County YMCA to offer a full-day summer school program of academics, enrichment, and social/emotional learning for students in all AOS 93 schools.

In Special Education, we are appreciative for the commitment of all staff who support students with disabilities despite a shortage of staff in many areas. Several of our staff (speech/language therapists, special education teachers, and educational technicians) took advantage of an opportunity to obtain professional development from the Maine DOE this year in Lindamood-Bell curriculum. The Lindamood-Bell curriculum is effective and evidence-based methodology that uses a unique sensory and cognitive based approach. Many school districts across the country have adopted these programs which have demonstrated very good results in student progress. We have already put the training into implementation and are excited about the differentiation it provides to students who need it most.

At South Bristol School, changes in school operations included the creation of a Leadership Team that works with the principal to review, assess, and intervene where changes and improvements are needed, as well as recognizing the school's strengths and success. A Multiple Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) was implemented to help educators provide academic and behavioral strategies for students with various needs. Staff have implemented a school-wide plan of enrichment opportunities. The middle school level has hosted several volunteer presentations and short trips off campus, including a week-long Witch Island experience.

Bristol Consolidated School completed nine years of PreK education. A portable classroom was installed in the summer to provide additional learning space in response to a rapid enrollment increase. Space, however, continues to be an issue the school and community are working to address. The school has a new well and other upgrades throughout that to improve the physical

plant and grounds. The new softball field was fabulous last spring.

Jefferson Village School continues to offer a number of enrichment activities for students, in conjunction with their academic instruction and learning. The 8th grade students participated in a service project for Veterans Day that included raking leaves at the Maine Veterans Cemetery in Augusta. The entire student body helped produce a video thanking Veterans for their service. Kindergarten students sang Christmas Carols, while outside, to residents of the Lincoln Home. JVS students collected and donated nonperishable items to the Jefferson Food Pantry to help families in need. Fifth through eighth grade students participated in hiking and fat tire bike riding at Hidden Valley Nature Center and the JVS Library held its annual Holiday Bizarre Fundraiser.

Nobleboro Central School students enjoyed playing soccer and basketball again after returning to in-person instruction in September. Chess club and homework club started up again. Sewing club and cheering club were new additions to extracurricular programming. STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and math) classes started up again for the 7th and 8th graders this fall. Fourth grade has enjoyed getting out to Hidden Valley Nature Center, CAL learned about the Wiscasset, Waterville and Farmington Railway at their site in Alna. Third and sixth grade classes have enjoyed FARMS Kitchen at the YMCA again, and the sixth grade held a food drive and delivered contributions to recipients.

Maine law recognizes the critical role schools have in the lives of our children: "Compulsory education is essential to the preservation of the rights and liberties of the people and the continued prosperity of our society and our nation. Maintaining regular student attendance is necessary to achieve the goal of an educated citizenry." The vibrancy of our local communities and their support for our CLCSS schools is essential for the attainment of student aspirations and success especially given the uncertainties and challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Our work together in the schools and communities is complex, challenging, and unquestionably essential and rewarding. Together we make a positive difference in the lives of our students, their families, and the communities in which we live and work. We are increasingly coming together as a learning community to engage in expanding our shared commitment for improving the education we provide to our children. The pandemic has not distracted us from our mission. Jefferson Village School

Over the summer of 2021, there remained an optimism of reduced impact of COVID-19 and a return to a "normal" school year. However, as the start of school neared, the threat of COVID-19 remained for our school, staff and students. Despite the pandemic we saw a successful end to a school year and the start of a new school year where all students had the opportunity to learn in person. We have worked through positive cases of COVID-19 within the school. Teachers have continued to offer in person education as well as maintaining a remote connection during times where students or classes have had to quarantine due to a COVID-19 exposure.

Jefferson has seen the addition of new students whose families have purchased homes in the active real estate market. We have many more students enrolled than we did last school year. Jefferson Village School has hired several new staff to fill positions to accommodate the increase for the 2021 school year. The following teachers have been added to the JVS staff to fill these new positions: Ryan Mahoney (3rd Grade), Kaitie Cummings (2nd Grade), Abigail Thompson (1st Grade) and Andrew Bartlett (7/8 Math and ELA). Along with the new hired positions, the following individuals were added to the JVS staff to fill existing vacancies: Barbara Williams (Middle Level Math Teacher), Darvan Hunt (Kindergarten Teacher), Tanya Chadwick and Zoey Sewell (Pathways Educational Technicians), Kristin Rivas (Title I Math), Randy Hayes (Bus Driver) and Maggie Brown (Administrative Assistant). A new school Nurse, Amy Tyrrell, was hired in October, JVS also hired Jason Adickes to serve as building principal. Mr. Adickes officially began duties on July 1, 2021. We continue to advertise and look to fill remaining vacancies within the school building.

The school building remains in top serviceable condition thanks to our custodial staff and John Carroll, our facilities manager. Five classrooms and the office area received new flooring as a part of the ongoing flooring upgrade plan as the original flooring has reached the end of its serviceable life. There are five classrooms remaining whose flooring will be updated in the summer of 2022. At that point all classroom floors will have been updated. We have begun a plan of changing existing classroom lighting to LED lights.

School based athletic teams resumed play in the Spring of 2021. Spring and fall sports seasons were able to be completed with minimal disruption. The winter basketball and cheering season has seen some disruptions due to COVID-19 cases, but schools, coaches and athletic directors are working tirelessly to deliver a complete season for our student athletes.

JVS continues to offer a number of enrichment activities for our students, in conjunction with their academic instruction and learning. Our 8th grade students participated in a service project for Veterans Day that included raking leaves at the Maine Veterans Cemetery in Augusta. The entire student body helped produce a video thanking our Veterans for their service. The video was distributed to Veterans in our Maine Veterans homes. Our Kindergarten students sang Christmas Carols, while outside, to residents of the Lincoln Home. JVS students collected and donated non-perishable items to the Jefferson Food Pantry to help our families in need. Fifth through eighth grade students participated in hiking and fat tire bike riding at Hidden Valley Nature Center. The JVS Library held its annual Holiday Bizarre Fundraiser. Thank you to the teachers and staff at JVS for continuing with these important enrichment activities for our students.

Jefferson Village School continues to enact operational procedures to help mitigate the spread of COVID-19. These procedures include following all State and Federal guidelines and recommendations. The Maine Department of Education in conjunction with the Maine CDC have issued several updates and modifications to the Standard Operating Procedure for response to positive COVID-19 cases. We continue to work with the DOE, Lincoln Health, the Maine CDC and our School Committee to respond appropriately.

Even though COVID-19 continues to remain a part of daily life, JVS is committed to continue to offer a quality educational experience for the students and families of Jefferson.

Lincoln Academy

To the Residents of Jefferson:

Greetings from Lincoln Academy, where, like schools around Maine and the world, we continue to face the daunting task of keeping school open during a pandemic. I am currently in my third year as Head of School, and what a tenure it has been! Despite the many challenges of 2020 and 2021, I am happy to report that we continue to deliver a top-notch education to our 585 students from 20 towns in Maine and ten countries around the world. In our most recent graduating class of 114 graduates in the Class of 2021, 64 are enrolled in 4-year colleges, 14 in 2-year colleges, 35 entered the workforce, and two entered the military. This year's senior class of 2022 is significantly larger, with 136 students.

After a year of hybrid learning in 2020-21, we moved to full-time, five-days-a-week learning in September of 2021. We are grateful to have Kerri Lilly, RN BSN as our new Director of the LA Health Center. In partnership with Lincoln Health, our Health Center has developed a school-wide plan that includes an indoor mask mandate and weekly Covid testing for 30% of our student body, starting with athletes and residential students. We also hosted three Lincoln Health vaccination clinics on the LA campus in May, 2021 and January, 2022. It has truly been a community effort.

Despite the ongoing interruptions caused by occasional Covid cases, we completed a fall sports season, put on a fully-staged production of *Oklahoma*, and hosted in-person winter band and choir concerts. Our sports teams are currently in their winter season, where all indoor practices and competitions (with the exception of swim) are masked. We continue to offer performing arts programs and over 40 clubs and extended learning opportunities as part of our new Focused Learning Block, a feature of the academic schedule introduced in September of 2021.

Improvements to our campus this year include a completely updated network to ensure the fastest possible internet connectivity for students and staff, continued ventilation updates to improve air quality, and the acquisition of a seasonal outdoor stage we call the Performing Arts Pavilion. It was wonderful to utilize this space for some of our senior week festivities last spring as well as theater and music performances.

More than 30 current and former trustees and friends have contributed to our "Bridge to Sustainability" fund, which continues our efforts toward fiscal sustainability. This restricted endowment will be used to offset debt payments in the annual budget. We are grateful for the generous support and vote of confidence for our leadership team as they continue to pursue other areas of growth to meet Lincoln's financial needs.

In addition to the fund itself, our long-term investments in sustainability include a fiscally responsible energy strategy. Utilizing best practices shared by other independent schools operating in aging buildings, the board's Buildings and Grounds Committee and the LA facilities team conducted an energy audit of our campus, which is shaping a multi-pronged plan for maintaining our facilities in the most economically and environmentally effective ways possible.

We appreciate the support of all of our sending towns. We are proud to celebrate a 220 year tradition of educating students from the Midcoast and beyond.

Erskine Academy

Dear Residents of Jefferson,

Erskine Academy hoped that this year's message to all of you would have COVID behind us, or nearly so. As we approach two years now with this pandemic, we are hopeful for the promise of a safer, healthier, and brighter 2022 nonetheless. Although we've yet to defeat the pandemic, it has not beaten us. The last year was challenging as we navigated in-person, hybrid, and fully remote teaching and learning; still, our response to the circumstances and the lessons learned strengthened our resolve to emerge a stronger and better Erskine Academy from this crisis.

Of the odd lessons taught by the pandemic is that change can happen quickly and forcefully. With little notice or time to prepare, every aspect of our educational approach was affected, dramatically changing schooling as we knew it. This traumatic year reminded us of the significance of community and empathy as the glue to keep us together. We met expectations and stressors by reconfiguring our physical space; adhering vigilantly to health and safety measures; investing in protective factors such as PPE, ventilation, and air filtration systems; and retraining and retooling with adaptive technologies and computer software. This is how we were able to return to school then, and this is how we are now able to stay in school one good school day at a time.

In Erskine Academy's 139th year, we continued to be a high school of choice that combines an independent education with the democratic ideal of quality education for all. Our core values—*Scholarship, Leadership, Stewardship, and Relationships*—were at work to produce results and deliver the highest educational experience possible while mitigating corona virus risks. A few facts about Erskine Academy today attest to our vitality and value:

- With 528 students in grades nine through twelve, we are the largest town academy in Maine to serve a nearly 100% local student body on a 100% school choice basis
- A 13:1 professional teacher to student ratio
- A 100% graduation rate; a 98% four-year graduation rate
- A dropout rate of less than one percent
- Of 120 graduates in 2021, 71% were accepted to higher or continuing education (now a nine-year trend), many to highly selective colleges and universities

Having no enrollment contracts with any community for a whole or portion of their high schoolers, we operate independently and exclusively on a school choice basis. This structure provides us with stability, enables us to be nimble in our operation, and expedites problem-solving and decision-making. At the same time, we focus on essential teaching and learning processes.

Although independent, we commit to our publicly-funded students by admitting all students from our eight sending towns who have completed the eighth grade and can benefit from our programs. Our enrollment generally exceeds 60% of the students from our collective eight sending towns.

Regardless of differences in residence, prior learning, interests, abilities, or personal circumstances and backgrounds, all of our students matter and belong. All who attend here experience a school program that blends traditional values with new programs and best practices to become the most academically and personally prepared young people in our region.

We have always considered industry certificates, two-year degrees, apprenticeships, and military service as higher education and, as such, viable pursuits. Therefore, we have created and sustained a comprehensive academic program to reflect and facilitate access to these experiences and four-year degree programs. We are one of the few high schools in the state to continue to offer shop technology, family and consumer economics, culinary arts, and business courses for exposure and entry-level work. Additionally, with 64 students pursuing a certificate in a craft or trade at the **Capital Area Technical Center**, Erskine's enrollment at CATC is second only to its host, Cony High School.

Staffed by three teachers and two educational technicians, Erskine's **Special Education** program educates and provides specialized support to students eligible for such services through an Individual Education Plan (IEP). Valuing all students and believing they deserve a welcoming school and professional teachers who will build on their strengths, 33% of our students receive academic assistance or special education services to support their learning.

Now in its tenth year, our *Jobs for Maine Graduates (JMG)* program has increased student exposure to various forms of higher education and vocational trades programs and has taught essential work seeking, training, and employment retention skills.

Last year, we offered 12 *Advanced Placement* courses, enrolling 152 students; 235 students enrolled across our 13 **dual enrollment courses** with nearby colleges—including Kennebec Valley Community College, Thomas College, the University of Maine, the University of Maine at Farmington,

Eastern Maine Community College, the University of Maine at Augusta, and Husson University—taught here by our teachers. For their efforts in these early college experiences, nearly one-half of our graduates earned college credits while in high school. From 2018 to the present, Erskine Academy students received college credit in a total of 1032 courses and realized substantial savings in college tuition to them and their families.

With 27% of our students receiving free and reduced breakfast and lunch, our student body is socioeconomically diverse. We were fortunate this year and last to participate in the Maine Department of Education's **Extended Summer Feeding Program**, which provided all students with tray breakfasts and lunches daily and at no cost to them. However, because our most vulnerable students live and learn in poverty, we continue to operate a school-based clothing and supplies cupboard and the "**Eagles Nest**," an open-access food pantry and backpack program from which students can obtain food for after school and weekends.

Pandemic conditions required our reimagining of favored traditions and activities. With masks, personal hygiene, and distancing in place, we enjoyed Homecoming, Winter Carnival, in-person Senior Week activities (including Baccalaureate, Class Night, and graduation), and the first Lobster Roll to provide financial and moral support for Maine Special Olympics. We also won the first regional competition "The Cereal Box Domino Challenge," raising and donating over 3,500 boxes of cereal to our local food pantries.

Other examples of our school community's goodwill are the thousands of hours of community service and substantial fundraising for important causes such as the Home for Little Wanders, the Ronald McDonald House, the Center for Grieving Children, and the United Way's Day of Caring. Through our embrace of volunteerism and stewardship, we engage meaningfully with our communities, and we experience giving back with appreciation and humility.

Since our founding in 1883, Erskine Academy has remained true to its mission while evolving to meet new demands, challenges, and uncertainties. Because there is no limit to what we can do, pursuing excellence and implementing our mission are continuous and unyielding works in progress. Our school accrediting agency affirmed this, *The New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc. (NEASC)*, who, in response to our Five-Year Interim Report, stated, "...the Commission wishes to note the level of attention which the school gives its students. You have developed a truly extensive and effective program—one that is singularly focused on students maximizing their experience and on the post-secondary experiences available to them."

We have heartfelt gratitude for our alumni and friends who believe strongly enough in our values and results that they give their time, talents, and financial donations. Their investment enables us to invest in programs and enhancements that state-set tuition alone cannot support and raises our expectations for ourselves.

We are grateful to our students, families, and sending communities for their confidence in and support for Erskine Academy. Together, we create a school and legacy that adheres to what we know is right and good for our young people and aids them to construct a strong start for adulthood.

Thank you, Jefferson residents, for sustaining high school choice for your young people and families, an opportunity for learning available to only 3% of Maine students. Those families who have chosen Erskine Academy—entrusting us with their children's intellectual, social, and personal development—inspire, honor, and motivate us to make an excellent school even better. In partnership and engagement with you, we look forward to new challenges and accomplishments in the year ahead.

Central Lincoln County (AOS 93) Adult & Community Education

I do not think any of us expected that the pandemic would impact us for a second year but it most definitely has! In the spring as we watched infection numbers drop and vaccinations rise, we were confident we would be back to life as normal in the not-too-distant future and that all of our classes would once again be face-to-face. However, as the Delta variant took hold, we realized our safety precautions needed to remain in place and that we needed to continue to make remote options available whenever possible. So that is what we did and despite all the ups and downs, we managed to assist five students with attaining their high school equivalency diplomas this past year! Our graduation ceremony, which was held at the Lincoln Theater, was our most moving one yet. Between our graduates' personal stories of obstacles overcome and a mesmerizing musical performance by one of them, most everyone present was brought to tears and filled with gratitude for all that our students had accomplished.

Between 2018 – 2021 we have served sixty-four students from our AOS 93 towns in our high school equivalency program and successfully graduated thirty-three of them! Sixty seven people accessed our college transitions services during that same time period and seven hundred thirty-five community members participated in one or more of our in-person or on-line enrichment activities! Our partnership with the other adult education programs in Sagadahoc, Knox, and Waldo counties, along with our partnerships with LincolnHealth, the YMCA, the National Digital Equity Center, the Academy of Medical Professions, and the Learning Resources Network, allows us to put forward offerings we typically would not be able to provide. Fortunately, most of the offerings through these partnerships can be accessed remotely which is especially beneficial during these uncertain times.

Last year, we lost almost a third of our revenue due to cancelled enrichment classes because of the pandemic. Thankfully, the Burns Family Foundation provided us with a grant to cover our losses and we were able to keep our doors open. I want to publicly thank them for their generous donation. It was a life saver for our program and we will always be grateful.

Finally, despite all the craziness and stress of this past year, Central Lincoln County Adult & Community Education has continued to make an impact in our communities and a real difference in people's lives. Thank you to all the AOS 93 communities for your ongoing support of our work. We are the "Learning for Work & Life" team and we are here for YOU!

Midcoast Conservancy

The mission of Midcoast Conservancy is to protect and restore vital lands and waters on a scale that matters, in partnership with the communities we serve, throughout the Midcoast Maine region through conservation, restoration, outdoor recreation and learning. Our service area comprises 24 towns, three watersheds and over 14,000 acres of conserved land which include 55 preserves and over 95 miles of trails.

In 2021, as Midcoast Conservancy's new Executive Director, I announced our 30x30 initiative, which aspires to conserve 30,000 acres of the midcoast area by 2030. Doubling our current conservation efforts will contribute significantly to protecting and restoring the vital lands and waters of the midcoast, act to mitigate the impacts of climate change, and ensure the quality of life our residents and communities deserve.

In Jefferson and nearby this year, Midcoast Conservancy did the following:

Ongoing **trail development and maintenance:** Two new bridges built at Stetser Preserve. Three bridges were repaired at West Branch Preserve.

Community programs: Guided hikes, as part of our Wednesday Wanders series at Davis Stream, Stetser, West Branch, and Hidden Valley preserves. In addition, we hosted a full year of educational and recreational programs at Hidden Valley Nature Center, for over 8000 visitors.

Water quality work: This year we began routine monitoring site in the Damariscotta Mills area of the lake and worked closely with local and state partners to communicate health concerns to the public regarding the cyanobacteria bloom in August. We launched a brand new social media program dedicated to Damariscotta Lake on Facebook and Instagram where we routinely post about our work.

We purchased equipment to start an in-house bacteria monitoring lab, with plans to launch a public health monitoring program on the lake in 2022. Our invasive aquatic plant programs continue to be critical to protecting Damariscotta Lake from invasive plants. In total we had 73 volunteers spend over 220 hours patrolling the shoreline and inspecting boats.

Nobleboro/Jefferson Transfer Facility

The Transfer Station, operated by Nobleboro and Jefferson, and under contract with Bremen, Damariscotta and Newcastle, provides for the disposal of most types of solid waste generated in the five towns. In 2021 our household waste, construction, demolition, and bulky waste all went to Waste Management in Norridgewock, Me. We use the services of Lincoln County Recycling to recycle cardboard, newspaper, plastic and many other products. We also recycle our universal hazard waste (televisions, computer, fluorescent light bulbs, mercury switches and rechargeable batteries).

2021 has seen come changes in our staff. Ernest "Allen" Oliver was our manager until he was in a motorcycle accident in May. We want to thank him for his time he put into the transfer station.

We had to make a decision and we decided it was best to move Brandon Achorn up to manager. He has done a great job with help of Glenn Daiute. They kept the facility running & running it smoothly. A big thank you to them for all the hard work and time they put in to keep it up and running.

We hired a part time person, Kevin Nunes to help out at the station. We also hired a 32-hour person, Ed McCabe on January 1, 2022. We now have a full staff to ensure everyone is being served. We want to take a moment to thank everyone for keeping their masks on during COVID-19 and keeping our staff safe. We know it has been a trying time for everyone. We were able to keep the station up and running all year without any interruptions. We hope your trip to the Transfer Station continues to be a positive experience.

I would like to thank everyone who takes the time to recycle. This effort really helps us save money in the long run. We do have programs for recycling paint, food waste, metals, electronics, paper and cardboard. In 2021 we had a hazardous waste day for people to get rid of their hazardous chemical and other hazardous materials. We hope to do the same again this year. We will be advertising for this so be watching for it.

The outlook for 2022 is we hope to continue our efforts to recycle whenever we can. The attendants are more than willing to help you recycle. Everything you recycle helps reduce the amount it costs to put items in the mainstream trash.

For 2022, our budget was up 3%. This is due to the increase in household trash. With the pandemic, more households found themselves cleaning more and throwing more trash away.

We are looking to keep things the same in 2022. We try to be as efficient as possible to save taxpayers money. Thank you for you cooperation with the staff. They enjoy working with you.

The Transfer Station is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. The front gate is closed at 3:50 p.m. each night to allow time to close out the computer. We are closed on Sunday and Monday. This allows our staff to have two days off in a row.

We will continue to review our operations in effort to provide good service and the most efficient Transfer Station possible. We are interested in your comments and recommendations and will attempt to incorporate them whenever possible.

In both cases it will avoid the necessity of calling a special town meeting in order to plow the roads or to give assistance to a qualifying resident if appropriated funds run out.

Art. 11. Shall the Town of Jefferson authorize the Select Board, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds for same? The Select Board is required to advertise the sale of such property for "sealed" competitive bid in the Kennebec Journal, Lincoln County News, and Portland Press Herald at least two weeks prior to such action and to sell such property to the highest bidder or sell it back to the previous owner.

The Select Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids. In the event that no bids are acceptable the Select Board may at their discretion choose another means available to sell the property, including listing with a real estate agent. Except that the Municipal Officers shall use the special sale process required by 36 M.R.S. § 943-C for qualifying homestead property if they choose to sell it to anyone other than the former owner(s).

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayments of taxes not yet committed and to pay interest rate of 0% (zero) as a courtesy to taxpayers who wish to prepay some or all of their uncommitted taxes.
